I have been giving a great deal of thought recently to the most forgotten figure in the Christmas story-- Joseph. I do not think I have ever heard a sermon preached on the great faith of Joseph. I have never encountered a book detailing how Joseph should be a role model for men everywhere as I have on Mary being such a role model for women. If Jesus's life was made into a movie, Mary would be played by some Hollywood starlet that we would see throughout the movie, while Joseph would be a B movie actor who had a bit part at the beginning of the show. The credits would never recount something like "and George Clooney in the role of Joseph." Yet, Joseph is the figure in the Christmas story that I believe we overlook at our peril, because he is the one that most resembles us.

Matthew tells us that Joseph was "a righteous man," a phrase many Christians would apply to themselves. The text continues by informing us that due to Mary's unexpected pregnancy, Joseph had decided to not subject her to public disgrace and divorce her quietly. The decision was made of course before Joseph had his encounter with the angel of the Lord. We often differ from Joseph, however, by deciding after our encounter with God to simply remain "righteous" while ignoring the duties that accompany such a declaration. Joseph was willing to lose his standing not only in his community and family, but his livelihood and possibly his life for the sake of answering God's call. The question that Joseph's life presents modern Christians is whether we can do the same ourselves?

When God speaks powerfully to our hearts are we willing to answer accordingly and forsake what we know and grasp the unknown? Can we honestly say that we would be willing to think and act and speak differently if it meant we would incur the ridicule of our friends and neighbors? Joseph would have been a righteous man that history would have never known if he had not been willing to risk it all to answer God's call. Instead, he became the male role model for the Son of God and a participant in God's plan to redeem the world from its sins. It seems like the role of a lifetime for some B movie actor now does it not? The decisions we make after we encounter God determine whether we will join Joseph in God's redemptive history or remain an insignificant bit player. I pray that as you sit amidst the twinkling lights and glittering garland this Christmas season, you recall Joseph's role in our celebrations and consider whether your faith matches his. I assure you that if it does, Christmas will twinkle and glitter more than ever before.



When you feel surrounded by darkness, please remember the promise that is contained in John 1:5. *The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it.* This promise is part of John's prologue to his Gospel, and the light he's talking about is Jesus. Jesus is the light who came into the world, and His light still shines through us. The darkness did not overcome it then, and the darkness will not overcome it now. You can hold on to that.

As you walk in this dark world, remember that you are carrying His light in you through the indwelling Holy Spirit. You can live with confidence that darkness cannot and will not overcome His light. You have the great privilege to let His light shine in you and through you into the darkness. The world surely needs it.


