Let me start off by saying that we Cains are not expert gardeners. This is our first attempt at growing plants in a raised bed, and we are definitely learning about how many seeds to plant in the available space.

This is true of both positive and negative things. Unkind actions and words, while small in themselves, can result in big hurts that have lasting effects. In the same way, small words of encouragement and deeds of kindness can multiply in their effect and have a lasting positive impact in people's lives.

Don't overlook small things that you can do for the Kingdom. You never know what kind of fruit they'll bring! (Hopefully, I can share some early results from our garden in next month's Messenger.)
