Last September, it seemed every time I turned on the radio the same song was playing. It seemed appropriate, it being September, that Green Day should be singing their timeless classic, "Wake Me Up When September Ends." I can say with all honesty as the time progressed it became my theme song given the tumultuous events of that month. We remain ever thankful for the support of our gracious faith family here at Grove Park over the subsequent year for without you, our journey would have been far more grievous. Confessionally, the sorrows of last September continue to impact our family. The tears don't flow as frequently or forcefully as they once did, but they do still arrive often unexpectedly.

I was reminded of the unexpected arrival of tears this summer as I was caught off guard by a wave while at Cape Cod National Seashore. The mouthful of sea water I received immediately invoked the taste of tears despite seawater's salinity being four times greater than human tears. A little later, when on the shore and the vastness of the Atlantic before me, I was struck by a couple of thoughts. First, the link between sea water and my tears reminded me that our sufferings are not singular, but universal. Sorrow too often places blinders on our vision that makes us believe we are the only ones experiencing such a bevy of emotions when the reverse is true. Every human on this planet is facing sorrow of one kind or another. The immensity of the Earth's oceans, covering some 71% of the planet's surface, should serve as a continuous reminder to us that sorrow affects all and invoke in us increased expressions of empathy, compassion, and kindness. Just as the seas either ebb and flow with the tides or rage and remain placid due to the wind and yet, the ocean's permanence does not change, so too is the case and nature of sorrow.

Secondly, we had been on the beach just a bit when suddenly a seal popped up in the waves. It would continue to surface intermittently the remainder of the afternoon always bringing us delight. We recognized though that potentially also lurking in the depths was the seal's deadly foe, the shark. Indeed, shark warning flags were flying. Thankfully, I failed to see a shark that day, but its potential appearance also did not cause me to refrain from entering the sea. Sometimes we choose to refrain from processing our sorrows or even acknowledge them because we fear what may be lurking beneath that might sink us, so we stay on shore. Yet Beloved, our refraining because of what might happen only keeps us from experiencing life abundantly, which is the gift of God to us. We should never allow the fear of possibilities to impede experiencing the joy of abundant life.

To that end, I feel it important to remind us of one other timeless truth that occurred to me that day as I contemplated the sea. I was thinking about how many individual tears would be required to fill the oceans when Psalm 56:8 sprang to mind. There David wrote, "You have kept count of my tossing; put my tears in your bottle. Are they not in your book?" If we view the seas as a representation of our sorrows and therefore composed of individual tears that are indistinguishable, it doesn't matter because God knows. God is intimately acquainted with our every sorrow and stands ever ready to provide the soothing salve of grace. May we ever seek that grace and be ready when God calls us to be the instrument through which that grace is administered to a deeply hurting world, and rest assured God is always calling us.
