Christmas, more than any other time of the year I believe, is bound to music. We can and do sing songs about the Easter season all the year long however, we only sing "Away in the Manger" in December. I have yet to meet anyone who does not have a favorite Christmas song, whether it be "Grandma Got Run Over By a Reindeer" or "Lo, How a Rose E're Blooming." Likewise, I have yet to meet anyone who has a favorite Labor Day song this and even as I write I am left to wonder if there is even such a thing as a Labor Day song. And so, it is this resolute bond between the Christmas season and music that keeps ringing in my head as the holidays approach, or maybe I should say echoes. I am unsure if it is my love of good organ music at Christmas that makes me believe that Christmas music should echo, but I firmly believe that it should.


The Christmas message, as expressed so well in the great carols of the faith, should echo within us. When the hymn writer states in "Lo, How a Rose E're Blooming" that "this flower, whose fragrance tender with sweetness fills the air, dispels with glorious splendor the darkness everywhere. True man, yet very God, from sin and death he saves us and lightens every load" it should echo in my life and shatter the places where I do not allow God to lighten my load and where the fragrance of God has lost its sweetness. Similarly, the veracity that "the wrong shall fail, the right prevail" should echo in my heart with such ferocity that it overwhelms the despair within me when I far too often agree with Longfellow's other line in "there is no peace on earth, I said; for hate is strong, and mocks the song of peace on earth, good-will to men!" Beloved, does the music of the season echo within your soul so as to cause meaningful change?

Additionally, Christmas music's power should echo beyond the season. Many years ago, I was looking through Enfield Baptist's vast Christmas music library when I came across an old German carol entitled "All This for Us." I had it included in that year's Christmas Music and even now, though I have forgotten most of the words, the power of that simple title "All This For Us" and the strength with which it was conveyed by the sopranos echoes in my heart every year. I confess, too many years of marching band have lessened my hearing, and I cannot always hear all the words, but music's reverberating power within me is felt and sustains me long after the music is filed away. Christmas music more than any other has such power, if we would only let it echo within us.

Now, some would argue the power of the echo is found in the message and I would be hard pressed to disagree. Yet, I must also acknowledge that the universality of the message is also key. Christmas music, more than any other genre, features music from around the world. German, Polish, Chinese, French, Native American, the list goes on and on of beloved Christmas carols culture of origin. The message though remains, God became incarnate in Bethlehem's manger for us and for our salvation. May we always be searching for ways to unleash the universality of the message that the echo may ring on for ages to come.

more room for the popular fiction books. If you want to stop by the library anytime through December 17, you can take and keep any books from the non-fiction section. Happy reading!





